 - Upcoming 3rd graders will practice foundations of multiplication using specified assignments on IXL with a score of 90% or better.
 - Upcoming 4th graders will practice multiplication facts using IXL.
 Fourth graders will be assessed the first week of school.
- 4. The completed and signed summer checklist is due Friday, August 20, 2021.

Inspire yourself to discover new books and authors this summer!

Ways to find new and interesting books to read and fun ways to write:

- Look for books with different themes (survival, injustice, empowerment, courage, love, good vs. bad, friendship). Use the Diversity in Community list provided for your required summer reading for suggestions.
- Read reviews about books. Ask your parents to follow Susannah Richards on Twitter @sussingoutbooks and follow your favorite authors on Twitter and other social media sites.
- Ask your parents to purchase you a subscription to GetEpic at <u>www.getepic.com</u>. They can sign you up for three months for only \$9.99. This special is good until June 17, 2021 and is for new customers only.
- Research Bullet Journaling and journal about your summer.
- Find books from your favorite authors and read different titles.
- Read different genres (adventure, fantasy, mystery, historical fiction, science fiction).
- · Try reading a graphic novel.
- Listen to a podcast.
- Take pictures of yourself reading in unique places or ways and either print them out and bring them to school the first week! Your teacher will share them with your classmates.



- Be a word collector find new and interesting words in the books you read over the summer. Write each word on an index card and put them in a jar.
 Bring the jar to school the first week and share them with your teachers and classmates.
- Keep a list of ALL the books you read over the summer so you can share them with your class.
- Read a cookbook with your parents. You will be practicing reading and math.
- Listen to audiobooks. Use this website www.booksontape.com to listen to clips and find more audiobook recommendations.
